

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN, CAYMAN DRAMA SOCIETY

In December 1989, when the Cayman Drama Society was considering whether to continue with the building of its own theatre, one of the major areas of concern was that we might be perceived as "deserting" the Harquail Theatre, as at that time we were the principal user of its facilities.

It is therefore extremely gratifying to note that, since the completion of the Prospect Playhouse in 1990, not only has the Cayman Drama Society grown dramatically, but two new drama groups using the Harquail Theatre have been formed: the Caymanites, who emphasise the development of youth theatre, and the Groundwork Theatre Company, producing Caribbean drama under the auspices of the Cayman National Cultural Foundation. We wish both groups every success, and I hope that we can work together in a spirit of friendly rivalry towards our mutual goal of a wider appreciation of dramatic art.

THE PERFORMERS



Although relatively new to the theatrical CONSUELO EBANKS is well known to the Caymanian public as an outspoken proponent of conservation, and for her active involvement in a variety of projects that are concerned with the culture and heritage of the Cayman Islands. A board member of the Cultural Foundation, Consuelo also serves on the National Trust's George Town District Committee and Botanical Gardens Committee, and is instrumental in organising the George Town Heritage Display each year during Pirates Week. Her love of orchids, which she goes to great lengths to collect, has led to her membership in the Orchid Society, and she enjoys collecting shells as well. Consuelo's twice-monthly column in the New Caymanian regularly brings the public's attention to environmental issues, giving a "voice" to the animals by allowing them to say their piece through her.

With her only other acting credit being a part in one of the productions of Frank McField's "Time Longer Than Rope" a decade ago, the role of Lettie in "The Fallen Angels" was a challenge.





PENNY PHILLIPS came to the Cayman Islands from Kenya in 1970. In 1971, she joined the Cayman Drama Society and has been active with the CDS in most plays since, more often than not backstage. Her first lead role was as Molly in "Love's a Luxury" in 1973, and she has performed in many other plays since. instrumental in presenting Cayman's first "British" style pantomime "Jack and the Beanstalk", which she directed at the George Town Town Hall in 1981. Although Penny has turned her hand more to direction than acting in the past year or so, in all her most recent roles she has played eccentric old women of one type or another. She portrayed the Queen of Hearts in "Alice, Queen of Wonderland", the old nurse in "Sganarelle", the wicked witch Carabosse in "Sleeping Beauty", Miss Bourne in the chiller "Ghost Train", Miss Tregunter-Jones in the Kiwanis' production of "Look, No Hans!" and, most recently, Cupess the Sorceress in "Robinson Crusoe".

The role of Katie is, as far as she is concerned, the most intricate and important one she has ever come to grips with.
